Everyone else was angry at the kallah's father for being so difficult, but the young man sincerely wanted to be the type of person his prospective father-in-law would want. The boy followed through on his pledge, turned his life around in a very real way, and the two got married with the kallah's father's blessing.

Did this *chassan* really change? Did he become the Vilna Gaon in a matter of months? Doubtful. But he

made some real changes, took concrete steps — and he davened that his prospective father-in-law would take note and have rachmanus.

The word teshuvah literally means "Returning to Hashem." Let's spend Yom Kippur doing teshuvah. Let's really find some things that we regret, really pledge to change, and daven to Hashem that he accept our teshuvah and erase all of our aveiros. Hashem has given us the opportunity to become different people. Let's make some changes and show that we are taking advantage of the love and the opportunity that Hashem has given us.

May all of our tefillos be answered in the best possible way.
